MARCH 14, 1700

"The morning of the 14th we reached the border of the lake. We made on the lake about 2 leagues. This lake may be $\frac{1}{4}$ of a league broad and $4\frac{1}{2}$ leagues long.

There may be in this nation 150 cabins in the space of 2 leagues on the edge of the lake. The main part of this village is opposite a little stream about 100 paces wide, on the banks of which are some cabins of the savages."

IBERVILLE

"The Taensas village is beautifully situated, but I fear that the lake which makes it so beautiful is somewhat unhealthy, for its water is stagnant, and its mists heavy."

"There are scarcely 100 cabins at Taensas..."
