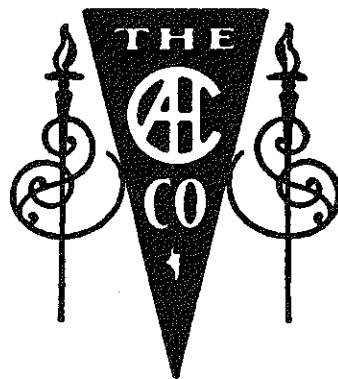
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Series I

Ship Tonnant, during the expedition against New Orleans in 1814-15, by Lieut. Col. C. R. Forrest, Assistant Quarter Master General, 1815; drawn on a scale of 20 3/4 miles to an inch. 18. A colored plan and profile of Fort Johnstone, near Charlestown, surveyed about 1770, by W. G. de Brahm, surveyor-general; drawn on a scale of 300 feet to an inch. Size, 1 ft. x 9 in. [Crown MS. 210. 2.]

"A plan of Fort Cumberland, on Will's Creek and Potomack River, with a view of the store houses belonging to the Ohio Company on the other side of the river," and shewing where the Virginia troops were encamped, 12 Feb., 1755; drawn on a scale of 80 feet to an inch. 28. A plan of Fort Augusta, on the Susquehanna River, at the junction of the north and west branches; drawn about 1756, on a scale of about 40 feet to an inch. Size, 1 ft. 4 in. x 1 ft. 1 in. [Crown cxxii. 10.]
29. "Profil coupe par une face d'un bastion du Fort Augusta;" drawn on a scale of 6 feet to an inch. Size, 1 ft. 3 in. x 9 in. [Crown cxxii. 11. b.]
30. A colored plan of Fort Bedford, on the Juniata Creek; drawn on a scale of 70 feet to an inch, with section on a scale of 20 feet to an inch. Size, 1 ft. 7 in. x 1 ft. 1 1/2 in. [Crown cxxii. 12.]
31. A colored "rough plan of Fort Ligonier" [on the Loyal Hanon Creek], with its outworks; on a scale of about 100 feet to an inch. Size, 1 ft. 7 in. x 1 ft. 4 1/2 in. [Crown cxxii. 13.]
32. A "plan of Fort Ligonier, with part of the retranchment;" drawn on a scale of 30 feet to an inch, with section of 5 feet to an inch. Size, 2 ft. 2 in. x 1 ft. 7 in. [Crown cxxii. 14.]
33. A military sketch, imperfect, of the disposition of some of the English and American troops, and of General Howe's headquarters, after the affair of White Plains, 25 Oct., 1776 (the scale is torn away). Size, 1 ft. 4 in. x 1 ft. 1 in. [Add. 16,367. e.]
34. A plan of the town of Albany; drawn in 1695, by John Miller; with a separate plan of the fort. Size, each, 8 in. x 6 in. [Add. 15,490, p. 7. fig. 3.]

A colored "plan of the city of Albany, with a design for the better securing it, by altering the ancient form of its stockade; adding a ditch in front, defended by a number of blockhouses, with a banquette within, from which a double fire of musquetry can be made through loopholes in the stockade," etc., etc.; drawn about 1756. Size, 1 ft. 4 in. x 1 ft. [Crown cxxi. 39.]
36. A colored "plan of the city of Albany, with the designs for securing it, by the addition of a ditch and rampart; with detached redoubts or blockhouses to take possession of the commanding grounds around the town; also shewing the proposed barracks for 640 men, hospital for 400 sick, and magazines for provisions;" drawn in 1756, on a scale of 200 feet to an inch; with plans and profils of the redoubts, on a scale of 14 feet to an inch. 41. A plan of "the Indian Fort at the Flats," four miles from Albany, drawn in 1695, by John Miller. Size, 6 in. x 4 in. [Add. 15,490. p. 7. fig. 6.]
42. A colored plan of the river Schohary; drawn on a scale of 2 miles to an inch: with a plan and elevation of the new fort of 35 feet to an inch; drawn about 1758. Size, 11 in. x 10 in. [Crown cxxi. 43.]
43. A colored "plan of the post at the Half Moon," at the junction of the rivers Hudson and Mohawk; drawn on a scale of 50 feet to an inch. Size, 1 ft. 5 in. x 1 ft. 1 in. [Crown cxxi. 57.]
44. A colored "plan of the buildings at the Half Moon;" drawn [by Capt. Abercromby?] on a scale of 50 [feet?] to an inch. Size, 1 ft. 5 in. x 11 in. [Crown cxxi. 68]
45. A plan of the fort of Scanecthadie, 20 miles N. of Albany; drawn in 1695, by John Miller. Size, 6 in. x 4 in. [Add. 15,490. p. 7. fig. 7.]
46. A colored "plan of Schenectady," on the Mohawk River; drawn [by Captain Abercromby?] about 1756, on a scale of 200 yards to an inch. Size, 2 ft. 4 in. x 1 ft. 10 in. [Crown cxxi. 99.]
47. A colored "plan of the entrenchment made round Herkumer's House, 1756," on the Mohawk River. Size, 10 in. x 7 1/2 in. [Crown cxxi. 70.]
48. A colored "plan of the forts at the Onoinda, or great carrying place, in the province of New York in America, built by Major General Charles Craven, by order of General Shirley, commander-in-chief in North America, and destroyed by Major-General Webb, 31 August, 1756, before they were finished; also of Genl. Webb's encampment within his entrenchment and breastwork, which he quitted 1 September, 1756, and retreated to the German Flatts;" drawn on a scale of 150 yards to an inch: with a plan of Fort Wood Creek on a larger scale. Size, 1 ft. 9 in. x 1 ft. 2 in. [Crown cxxi. 30.]
49. A colored "plan of Fort Stanwix, built at Oneida station, by provincial troops, in 1758." drawn by John Williams, sub-engineer, on a scale of 30 feet to an inch; with sections on a scale of 10 feet to an inch. Size, 2 ft. x 1 ft. 6 in. [Crown cxxi. 99.]

50. A colored "plan of Fort Stanwix, built at the Onnida station, 1758;"
